Race, Gender, and Ethnicity in Latin America

This course explores major themes in the anthropology of Latin America. It is intended for upper-level or advanced undergraduates and masters students. The course is highly interactive and requires commitment and full participation by the students. This course will focus on the history of anthropological research that has been conducted in Latin America. Many of the readings address patterns of gender, sexuality, race, and ethnic relations, as they have shaped national identity and social and political history in Latin American. Our scope will span from pre-Columbian society to the present. We will highlight Mesoamerica; and also the indigenous groups that have migrated to the US. This course will be taught in Spanish and readings will be assigned in English and Spanish.

What are KULAC courses? KULAC is a group of courses and special discussion sections *that are taught in a foreign language*. Students in these courses study subjects that interest them while sharpening their foreign language skills. In KULAC courses you hone and refine your foreign language competency by learning specialized vocabulary used by professionals in your career field.
