By drawing from different disciplines we can better understand this region and its people. 	This class examines the African Diaspora to Latin America during the era of the Atlantic slave trade. Specifically, this course explores the variety of ways in which Africans and their descendants sought to forge communities and identities both as slaves and free-persons. Emphasis will be placed on highlighting differences across this broad region. Differences in demography, political economy, and colonial social structures led to a diversity of Afro-Latin identities and communities. We will examine the ways in which corporate communities, including cofradias, militias, and cabildos de nacion, provided social spaces for Africans to form collective identities. Students will be asked to read a variety of monographs, articles, and primary sources all of which should help illustrate the variety of social and cultural factors utilized by Africans in forging new American identities.
